



The Relevance of Registry Research for Clinical Practice: Gender Differences in Left Ventricular Assist Device Recipients with a Focus on Psychosocial and Behavioral Factors

PROGRAM

The number of men and women with heart failure is rising both in Europe and in the US. Advances in technology provide new options for patients with advanced disease by way of mechanically assisted pumping devices. Yet, how do women with failing hearts fare compared to men after implantation of a left ventricular assist device (LVAD), the most common device type? How can clinical practice to be improved for both women and men? Data from registries such as the Interagency Registry for Mechanically Assisted Circulatory Support (INTERMACS) and the European counterpart (EUROMACS) hold great promise to yield relevant answers.

This scientific workshop will bring together scientists working with INTERMACS and EUROMACS. Researchers from the fields of Psychology, Medicine, Nursing Science, and Statistics will connect and exchange their know-ledge and ideas, in order to develop further questions and collaborative ways to improve clinical practice and enhance outcomes for both women and men on LVADs.
