Dr. Ashis Nandy

Ashis Nandy, who was born in 1937, is a Senior Fellow and (since 1992) the Director of the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, Delhi. He is the author of a great number of publications on political psychology, cultures of science, utopias and visions and on popular culture. His latest book (with Zia Sardar and Merryl Wyn Davies) "Barbaric Others: A Manifesto on Western Racism" offers a unique perspective on an adversarial world view that has allowed the West to see other peoples as barbarians, infidels, and even 'savages'. The authors provide a succinct and shameful history of the racism and xenophobia that have shaped western thought from ancient Greece to the present day. Ashis Nandy studied at the Universities of Calcutta, Nagpur und Gujarat. He holds an M. A. in sociology and a Ph. D. in clinical psychology. He has affiliations to and is a member of many scientific institutions all over the world.
